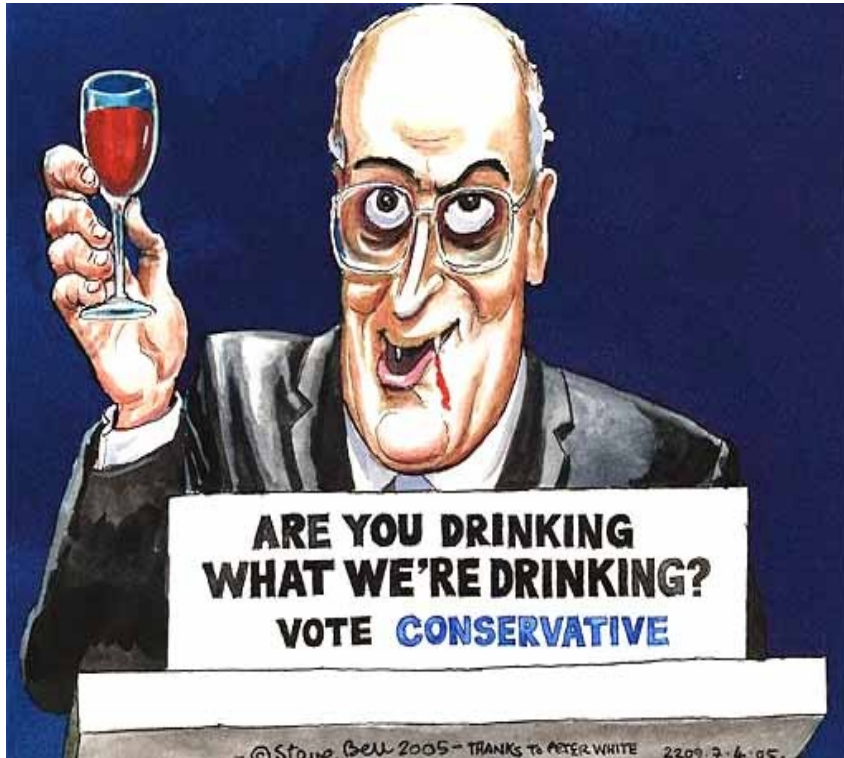

Scope of project

- Early intervention essential
- Hybrid collections of paper and digital records
- What is more important, content or ‘look and feel’?
- Metadata: technical, preservation, administrative
- Digital repositories: DSpace and Fedora software

Accessions – Digital

- Documentation
 - deposit agreement requests permission to create multiple copies for preservation purposes
- Ingest of digital material – processes
 - encryption
 - authenticity (creation of checksum)
 - automated creation of metadata
 - unique identifier
 - virus checker
 - quarantine

Digital Preservation

- Bit-stream preservation, the starting point for future preservation strategies
- Migration
- Emulation
 - Camileon project
- Dual approach
 - certain digital objects suit particular strategies

Metadata

- Metadata provides information about content, quality, condition and other characteristics of data
- Administrative metadata (technical, preservation & rights)
- METS (Metadata Encoding and Transmission Standard) - associates digital objects and their metadata
- Descriptive metadata (EAD) can be embedded or linked to a METS file.

File Formats

Paradigm will work with as many file formats as possible

Collecting institutions can't generally dictate preferred file formats

Proprietary closed source v open source software (OSS)

PDF/A : Portable Document Format/Archival

PRONOM file format registry

JISC

OAIS Model (open archival information systems)

a comprehensive model describing all the functions of a digital repository

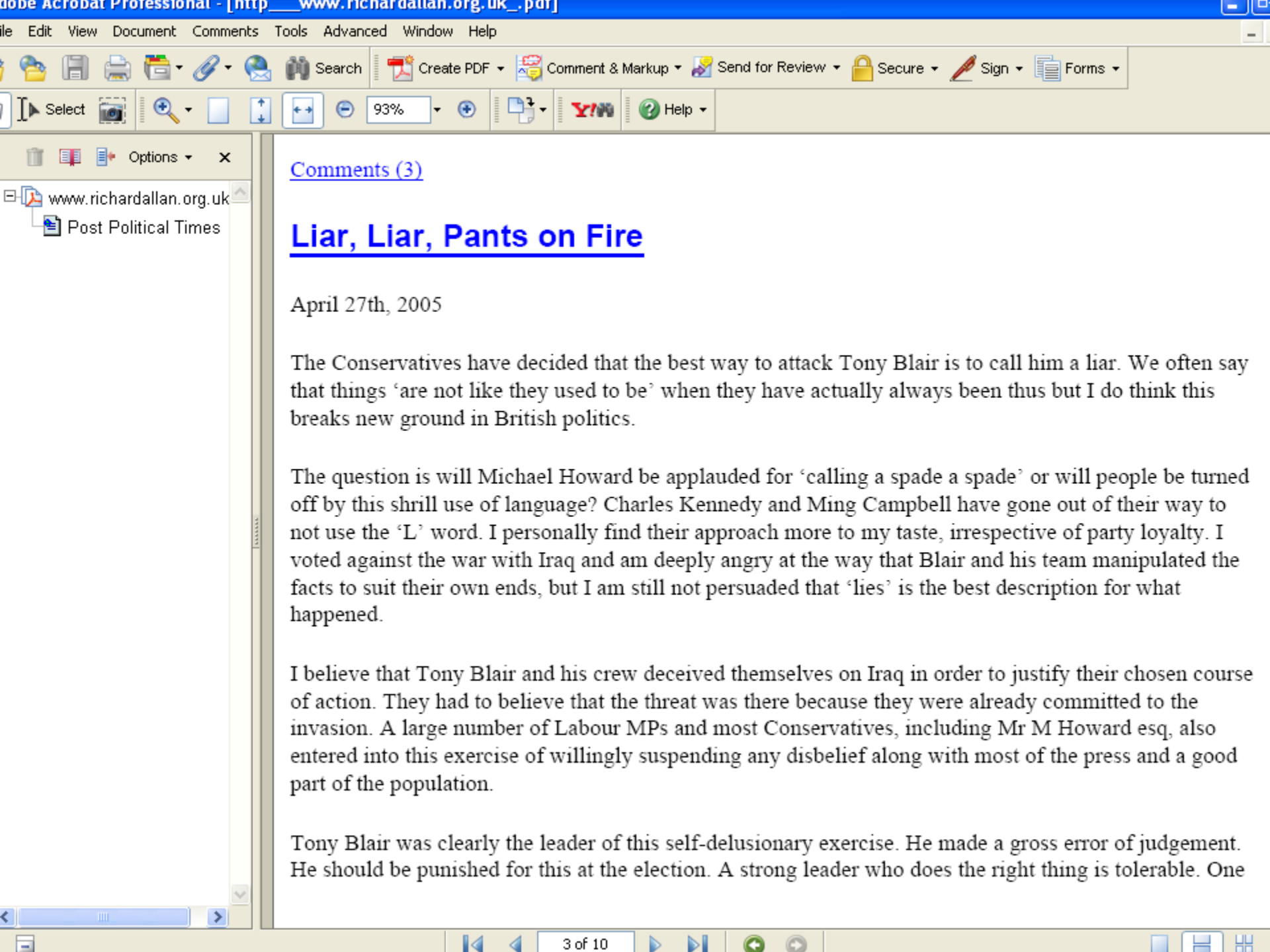

The Conservatives have decided that the best way to attack Tony Blair is to call him a liar. We often say that things 'are not like they used to be' when they have actually always been thus but I do think this breaks new ground in British politics.

The question is will Michael Howard be applauded for 'calling a spade a spade' or will people be turned off by this shrill use of language? Charles Kennedy and Ming Campbell have gone out of their way to not use the 'L' word. I personally find their approach more to my taste, irrespective of party loyalty. I voted against the war with Iraq and am deeply angry at the way that Blair and his team manipulated the facts to suit their own ends, but I am still not persuaded that 'lies' is the best description for what happened.

I believe that Tony Blair and his crew deceived themselves on Iraq in order to justify their chosen course of action. They had to believe that the threat was there because they were already committed to the invasion. A large number of Labour MPs and most Conservatives, including Mr M Howard esq, also entered into this exercise of willingly suspending any disbelief along with most of the press and a good part of the population.

Tony Blair was clearly the leader of this self-delusionary exercise. He made a gross error of judgement. He should be punished for this at the election. A strong leader who does the right thing is tolerable. One
